## The Life of Jesus

Matthew 20: 20-34; Mark 10: 35-52; Luke 18: 35-19: 10

### EVENTS AT JERICHO

During the journey to Jericho, Salome, the mother of James and John came to Jesus with her sons, asking a favor, and Jesus said:

*"What dost thou want?"*

She asked that He give her sons places at His right and left hand in His kingdom, and Jesus asked:

*"Can you drink of the cup which I am about to drink?"*

They replied that they could, and Jesus said:

*"Of My cup you shall indeed drink, but as for sitting at My right hand and My left hand, that is not Mine to give thee. It belongs to those for whom it has been prepared by My Father."*

The other disciples were angry at James and John, but Jesus called them all together and said to them:

*"You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great men exercise authority over them. Not so is it among thee. On the contrary, whoever wishes to become great among thee shall be your servant and whoever wishes to be first among thee shall be your slave.*

*Even as the Son of Man has not come to be served but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many."*

At Jericho, two blind men by the wayside cried out to Jesus for mercy, though the crowd tried to silence them. He stopped and said:

*"What will you have Me do for you?"*

When they asked that their sight be restored, Jesus in compassion touched their eyes, and they recovered their vision and joined His followers.

In the crowd at Jericho was Zacchaeus, a publican who was a short man, he could not see Jesus, so he climbed a tree by the wayside to get a better view. As Jesus passed him, He looked up and said:

*"Zacchaeus, make haste and come down for I must stay in thy house today."*

The crowd complained that He should accept the hospitality of a public sinner, but Jesus commended Zacchaeus:

*"Today salvation has come to this house, since he, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and save what was lost."*

## LIVES OF THE SAINTS

Occasionally in this space will appear a short article covering the lives of the saints, especially with reference to those saints whose likeness appear on the stained glass windows in the church and chapel, or whose statue is present in the chapel area or the candle room area.

### ST. BENEDICT

*Patron of Europe & Against poisoning*

As a boy, Benedict studied in Rome and his fellow students caroused more than they studied. But Benedict believed there was more to life. He left school, abandoned his family and went to Subiaco to live as a hermit in a cave. Wearing only animal skins he prayed and studied Scripture for three years where a friendly Monk lowered him bread on a rope.

Respect for Benedict's holiness grew and one day some monks asked him to be their abbot. Unaccustomed to his strict discipline, however they rebelled and tried to poison Benedict. When Benedict blessed the tainted wine, the cup shattered saving his life.

Soon Benedict founded 12 monasteries. He traveled to Monte Cassino where he founded the home of the Benedictine Order. At this monastery he wrote his famous Rule of St. Benedict "which became the code for monks in western Europe.

Benedict's happy brotherhood of monasteries became a civilizing influence in a troubled Europe. Prayer and contemplation gave him the insight to help found an Order that still exists more than fourteen centuries later.

### SAINT OLGA (Helga)

Olga was also known as Helga. She married Igor, Duke of Kiev. When Igor was assassinated she reacted with vengeance and had her husband's murderers put to death. Then Olga ruled the Country as regent for her son Svyatoslav until he came of age.

Olga became a Christian and was baptized in Constantinople. She was one of the first Russians to be Baptized. She devoted the rest of her life to the spread of Christianity.

### ST. ANTHONY ZACCARIA

*Priest*

Anthony was born in Italy of noble parents but lost his father when he young. His mother saw to it that he received a good education. He studied medicine at the University of Padua and returned home at the age of twenty-two as a physician. But he quickly realized that his vocation consisted in healing souls as well as bodies.

Accordingly, this devoted young man studied theology but continued to practice medicine. He assisted the dying spiritually, taught catechism to the young and placed himself completely at the service of everyone. After his ordination, he was encouraged to go to Milan, Italy where there were greater opportunities for serving his fellowman.

Anthony along with two other zealous priests founded a congregation to help regenerate the love of Divine worship and a proper way of life. This was the Order of Clerks Regular of St. Paul. They minister night and day to the people of Milan who were stricken by wars, plague and neglect of clergy. At the age of thirty-seven Anthony died worn out by his many labors.

### ST. MARIA GORETTI

*Patroness of Youth*

Maria Goretti was called "the St. Agnes of the 20th century, by Pope Pius XII. Maria was born in Italy and was the third child of seven children. Her father died when she was nine and Maria helped out with the younger children.

Maria was attacked by a wicked minded youth, striking her several times with a long dagger. She was rushed to the hospital and the surgeons gave up hope to save her. She died the next morning but she clearly forgave her attacker.

After twenty seven years in prison, the man who attacked her, gave evidence at her canonical inquiry. He hastened to beg forgiveness of Maria's mother and became a Capuchin lay-brother.

## Our Faith

### STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The Stations of the Cross are a devotion and practice that can bring people into a deep and true realization of what God has done for them.

**1. *Jesus is condemned to death for me.***

He is taking all my sins on himself so I do not have to die forever. He accepts this gruesome punishment on my behalf.

**2. *Jesus carries His Cross.***

He bore all the weight of my sin and the sins of all the world on His shoulder. Christ carried all our sin.

**3. *Jesus Falls the First Time.***

The weight is too much for the body already scourged. He bows under the weight and the terrible injuries already inflicted. Lord, forgive me for my sin that contributed to that crushing weight, forgive me.

**4. *Jesus Meets His Mother.***

There are no words to describe the pain that Mary bore as she watched her Son suffer in such agony. Each, in their own way, yields to the will of the Father for our salvation.

**5. *Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry His Cross.***

Lord, thank You for helping me to carry my crosses. May I in turn help others to carry the crushing weight of their sorrow.

**6. *Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus.***

Such a small gesture in such a time of horror, yet Jesus rewards even the smallest act of charity of kindness, of mercy and blesses those who perform them. May I never despise small acts of kindness of those I give and those I receive.

**7. *Jesus Falls the Second Time.***

What a desperate moment when our strength won't hold out, when we are helpless in the midst of enemies even with friends we can feel humiliated. Jesus bore that humiliation for you and for me. We are never alone, even in the most challenging of times.

**8. *Jesus meets the Women of Jerusalem.***

He comforts them as they try to minister to His needs. This is the call to the whole body of Christ in suffering give and receive.

**9. *Jesus Falls a Third Time.***

How physically crushing, how helpless, how humiliating, yet He does it for us.

**10. *Jesus is Stripped of His Garments.***

Again and again He is degraded and humiliated beyond speech. Yet He bore it all in silence.

**11. *Jesus is Nailed to the Cross.***

It is a miracle that He is still alive, and He chooses to be, that He might drain the cup of suffering to the last drop for you.

**12. *Jesus Dies on the Cross.***

A man with big plans and big ideas is gone just like every other human being.

**13. *The Body of Jesus is taken Down from the Cross.***

How infinitely sad it must have been for those moments as Mary held Him in her arms. The sky darkened and the wind grew stronger... He was gone.

**14. *Jesus is Laid in the Tomb.***

The disciples scattered, confusion, fear, anger and doubt must have assailed them all. But Mary waited.
