"He was called Jesus....."

The Miracle at Greccio

The Miracle at Greccio began the tradition of the Christmas Crib and the celebration of Midnight Mass. It is a great testimony of St. Francis of Assisi whose heart burned with love, hope and renewed faith at the great gift of love which is Christ.

In December 1223, St. Francis was returning from a visit to Rome where the Rule for his brotherhood had been approved by Pope Honorius III. While in Rome, St. Francis was received by Cardinal Hugolina and was surrounded by great attention. The humble Francis quickly left Rome for his home in Assisi, On his way, he stayed with some of his Franciscan Brothers in the Sabine Mountains.

In the same area lived a spiritual man named John Vellita who held the Brothers in high esteem. John had given the Brothers a piece of land on the outskirts of Greccio. When he came to visit the Brothers, John was presented with an unusual request. St. Francis wanted to celebrate the Holy Night of Christmas by replicating the scene at Bethlehem.

The Franciscans were to use a nearby cave and set up a troth filled with straw. John Vellita was to bring an ox, a donkey and eagerly he helped bring the plan into action. Upon hearing of the goings on, the people of the town gathered together lit torches and made their way up the hillside towards the cave. They found the Brothers around the scene with lighted candles, and beneath the manger, with the Baby Jesus, was a simple altar, for Mass to be celebrated.

The people of the town were spellbound by the words of St. Francis and tears of humility and joy was present throughout the vast crowd. Francis picked up the Infant figure of the Christ Child.... then the Child smiled at Francis. In Greccio today, a Church has been built on the site and is still popular of pilgrimages, especially during the Christmas season.

Note:

To understand the special events that occurred at Greccio, we must first remember that Saint Francis of Assisi had a very special love and tender devotion for the Christ Child.

The Christmas feast was a time of great emotion of him. Francis viewed the celebration as a privilege and spoke of Christmas as a feast of gentleness, humility, generosity and above all poverty. It is said that the Saint's heart melted with love at the thought of this little child born in a stable.

LIVES OF THE SAINTS

Occasionally in this space will appear a short article covering the lives of the saints, especially with reference to those saints whose likeness appear on the stained glass windows in the church and chapel, or whose statue is present in the chapel area or the candle room area.

ST. JOHN OF THE CROSS

Patron of Contemplatives

John knew poverty and hardships early in life. His father, who had been disowned by his family for marrying beneath him, died soon after John's birth, leaving his family with little means for support.

John was educated in a school for poor children and worked in a hospital for patients with venereal diseases. His empathy for the poor and compassion for the sick loved him to become a Carmelite.

Ordained a priest, John met Teresa of Avila who asked him to help reform the Carmelite Order. He took the name John of the Cross and moved with another friar into a house near Avila. The Order was known as the Discalced (shoeless) Carmelites, because the men walked about barefoot to symbolize their dedication of poverty.

Many Carmelite brothers felt threatened by the reform, however, and took drastic measures to stop it. John was arrested and moved to another monastery where he was locked in a narrow cell without windows. Although he was beaten regularly, John refused to renounce his new Order. After nine months, John miraculously escaped.

John is now famous for his poems and other writings. *The Dark Night of the Soul* is one of his most well known works. In it he explains how a person must let go of temporal attachments to make room for God's presence.

John continued to suffer injustice from others, but always until his death, at the age of 49 years old, believed his suffering brought him closer to God.

Lord, you endowed St. John of the Cross with a spirit of self-denial and a love for the cross.

ST. MARY di ROSA

Foundress of the Handmaids of Charity

Born into a large Italian family, Paula di Rosa was a delicate girl whose father was a wealthy textile owner. Her family was devoted to the Church. When Paula was just a child, her mother died, and Paula was educated by nuns.

At the age of seventeen, she left school to take charge of her father's household. Although her father tried to find her a husband, Paula did not want to marry. Instead, she wanted to dedicate her life to helping others. So she began with the women and children who worked in her father's textile mill, arranging retreats and missions as well as establishing a women's guild.

During a deadly cholera epidemic, Paula bravely tended to the sick in the hospital. Her work was so impressive that she was asked to run a workhouse for the poor and abandoned girls. Worried that many of the girls had no place to sleep at night, Paula opened a small boardinghouse for them. She also started a school for girls who were hearing impaired, but wanted to do even more.

When Paula was twenty-seven she founded a religious society called the Handmaids of Charity which was dedicated to the physical and spiritual care of the poor and the sick. When Italy was at war Paula and her sisters offered their services at a military hospital. Despite the doctors' opposition the Handmaids provided comfort in the hospitals and also to the wounded and dying on the battle-field.

When her congregation was finally approved in the year 1850, Paula took the name of Mary of the Crucified. She died five years later from physical exhaustion, Her faith and selfless works remain an inspiration to this day.

Lord, teach us to nurture all children in a community of hope and help make the world a better place. Amen

On October 4, 1943, in the middle of World War II, Bing Crosby recorded "I'll be Home for Christmas." This song was one of his most famous Christmas songs (surpassed only by his "White Christmas" and "Silent Night.") The song became emblematic of the separations caused by the war. "Wars" in families can cause separations also. Make plans to come home to your family, even if it involves some forgiveness.

No home, No Church is perfect. It is simply a place where imperfect people treat each other with a kindness that no one has to earn. At Christmastime we belong with our family and with our Church. It is the birthday feast of the Son of God who called everyone his brothers and sisters.

THE CHRISTMAS SEASON

At first Christians noted Christmas as just a religious holiday; but it gradually took on a secular aspect with feasting, the exchanging of gifts and general rejoicing. During the Middle Ages, Christmas was observed both in churches and homes.

The Dutch who settled in New Amsterdam brought with them the idea that St. Nicholas was the gift giver. When the Puritans reached New England they brought with them their dislike for any observance of Christmas and levied fines on those who dared to celebrate the holiday.

It was not until the nineteenth century that holiday celebrations became popular. Therefore our American Christmas is a most interesting and unusual one for it includes customs from faraway lands.

THE TIME OF ADVENT

If we have truly given our humanity to be changed into Christ, it is essential to us that we do not disturb this time of growth. I We shall not see Christ's radiance in our lives yet, it is still hidden in our darkness.

Nevertheless, we must believe that He is growing in our lives. We must believe it so firmly that we cannot help relating everything literally everything to this almost incredible reality.

Advent awareness does not lead to a selfish preoccupation with self; it does not exclude outgoing love to others, far from it. It leads to them inevitably, but it prevents such acts and words of love from becoming distractions. It makes the very doing of them reminders of the Presence of Christ in us.

EVERGREENS and IVY
