THE ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL

Outreach to the Poor and Vulnerable

Diocesan Parish Counseling Services: Parishioners have access to short term counseling (up to 6 sessions) at locations throughout the Diocese. The program was developed by Catholic Charities and the Diocese of Trenton. Licensed counseling professionals are available to help parishioners through difficult issues such as marital problems, raising children, eldercare, bereavement or the stress of job loss that can be successfully addressed by brief counseling support. Pastors and parish priests of the Diocese can refer parishioners to the parish counseling services.

Parish Emergency Assistance Program:: Emergency financial assistance to individuals through the parish and coordinated by Catholic Charities is available.

Diocesan Social Service Workshops: Information and resources to parishes and Catholic Social Service agencies are available to enhance Diocesan Catholic Social Service.

Home Health Nursing Program: Free in-home nursing and home health services are available to Seniors in Greater Trenton through Mt. Carmel Guild.

Emergency Assistance: People in Mercer County are able to receive food through Mt. Carmel Guild. Over 30,000 received food though this program last year.

The Life of Jesus

Matthew 8: 19-22; Luke 9:51-62; John 7: 2-13

JESUS LEAVES GALILEE

Towards the end of September Jesus left Capernaum for Nazareth. He found His brothers making preparations for their trip to Jerusalem for the Feast of the Tabernacles. Though they had no faith in Him, they invited Jesus to go with them to Jerusalem and stake His fortunes on a public manifestation. He said them:

"My time has not come, but your time is always at hand. The world cannot hate you, but it hates Me because I bear witness concerning it that its works are evil. As for you, go up to the feast but I do not go up to this feast, for My time is not yet fulfilled."

So Jesus remained behind when His relatives set out on their pilgrimage to Jerusalem. The time for His public entrance into the Holy City was months distant.

When He finally left, about a week after the others, He avoided the usual pilgrim rout and made directly for Jerusalem across Samaria. To insure accommodation, He sent some of the disciples ahead to the town where they were to spend the night. When the Samaritans recognized the disciples were Jewish pilgrims, they refused to receive them. James and John asked Christ to punish this affront but He rebuked them instead saying:

"You do not know of what manner of spirit you are; for the Son of Man did not come to destroy men's lives, but to save them."

About this time a Scribe came to Jesus and said he would follow Him wherever He went. Jesus replied:

"The foxes have dens, and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.

To another aspirant, who wished first to bury his dead father, Jesus said:

"Leave the dead to bury their own dead, but do thou go and proclaim the Kingdom of God."

To the third, who wished to say farewell to his family, Jesus replied:

"No one having put his hand to the plow and looking back is fit for the Kingdom of God."

Summary

The way we react to opposition often indicates how well we have understood the meaning of Christ's teaching. When the disciples were refused lodging, they wanted Christ to call down fire from heaven and to destroy the inhospitable Samaritans.

But Christ reminded them that His followers were to save men, not to destroy them.

ST. TERESA BENEDICTA

Patroness of Europe and Others

Edith Stein was born on October 12, 1891 in Germany. The Steins were Orthodox Jews but Edith renounced her faith as a teenager and declared herself an atheist. Edith was a brilliant student and was one of the first German women allowed to enter a university. She studied with a world famous philosopher and after earning her Ph.D, became his assistant.

Edith seemed destined for a distinguished academic career until in 1921 she read the autobiography of St. Theresa of Avila. Struck by the saints words, Edith was baptized a Catholic and began teaching at a Catholic school.

Edith entered the Carmelite Order at Cologne and took the name of Teresa Benedicta of the Cross. Teresa faced a growing danger in Germany as anti -Semitism continued to rise. The new nun feared that the Nazis might punish others of her Order, for protecting a Jew, so she transferred to a Carmelite Order in the Netherlands. Germany soon invaded that Country and started to arrest all Dutch Catholics of Jewish descent.. In 1942 Teresa was sent to Auschwitz where she died in a gas chamber. Survivors of the camp praised her for her compassion for others facing death.

ST. CLARE OF ASSISI

Patroness of Embroiderers and Television

Clare was born to wealthy patrician family in Assisi, Italy. Even as a child, Clare seemed devoted to prayer and desirous of a more spiritual life. Inspired at the age of eighteen by St. Francis when he came to preach in a local church, Clare begged him to help her live a humble religious life.

Late on Palm Sunday, she ran off to St. Francis's chapel and had her hair cut off, wore penitential clothing and vowed herself to the service of Jesus. When her family and friends tried to take her home, she successfully resisted their efforts. Francis moved Clare and the other female followers including her sister Agnes to a poor house near the church of San Damiano.

Clare was appointed superior of what would become the first community of Poor Clares. Under Clare's leadership the community lived austerely, fasting frequently, wearing nothing on their feet, sleeping on the ground and speaking only when necessary. They refused to own property and lived in absolute poverty and simplicity.

Pope Gregory IX and later Pope Innocent IV offered to help the Poor Clare's they refused saying that money would bring conflict, power and control. During her lifetime, Clare saw her sister Beatrix, her mother and her aunt join the Order.

Our Faith

SACRED SPACE

Christians can become so familiar and comfortable that we sometimes forget how we are meant to behave in this "Sacred Space." The space inside a Church is sacred not only because we gather for the communal purpose of celebration the Eucharist there, but also because we believe that God is present in the Eucharist reserved in the Tabernacle (Real Presence).

The Church is never meant to be a stadium or a Concert Hall and one of the ways we remind ourselves that we are standing in sacred space is by developing a sense of what I like to call sacred quiet. Sacred quiet reminds us that we are standing in the presence of a loving God. Sacred quiet reminds us to be mindful of those who are praying in this space and not threaten their quiet with needless conversation of frivolous behavior. Sacred quiet helps us to distinguish between necessary converse and unnecessary noise.

Necessary converse might be the inquiries about the health of a parishioner, the cordial greeting extended to those around us, or the offer of condolences when a loved one has died.

Unnecessary noise might be the discussion of dinner plans, the scores of last night's big game, or the frivolity associated with telling a joke. It would be easy to suggest a ban on talking in Church but such a ban would be unenforceable and not very Christian.

All of us are called to have a sense of sacred quiet particularly with regards that space that we call sacred. Please limit the ordinary and prolonged conversations to outside of the Church. Make every effort to be respectful of the Tabernacle and assume that those who might be in a pew inside the Church are there because they want to pray in peace and quiet. We should remember that when we find ourselves standing in sacred space, we are called to a sense of sacred quiet.
